5 Hawai'i Language Teachers Needed for Paid Summer Institutes

SWCOLT is joining the Pacific Northwest Council for Languages (PNCFL) in supporting the Western Initiative for Language Leadership (WILL). WILL was developed and is supported by the Center for Applied Second Language Studies (CASLS) at the University of Oregon, Eugene. The goal of WILL is to prepare a cadre of young/new rural teachers for leadership in the professional field and in their communities. The program targets young/new teachers who have little access to professional development opportunities. In other words, teachers from Hawai'i stand to reap the benefits of this program because we are isolated on the various islands. (We believe this large grant will pay the expenses of the participants but are waiting for further details on this.)

Grantees get to participate in two consecutive summer institutes. In Year One, the teachers develop action research projects. Mentors contact them regularly throughout the year to encourage and guide them. In Year Two, participants present results of their projects and develop leadership projects. These leadership projects are their induction into leadership roles within their schools, communities, or professional associations. One participant created a mentoring program for her school, another organized a state conference, two others teamed up to lobby their legislature to make foreign languages a core content area. Each state organization of SWCOLT, including Hawai'i, is asked to identify and nominate up to 5 teachers for this initiative.

The outcomes thus far have been:

- 1. The training of 32 young, rural teachers with leadership potential
- 2. A community of practice has been developed among this cadre
- 3. Thirty two action research and leadership projects
- 4. At least five participants are already in positions of professional leadership

SWCOLT REGIONAL TEACHER OF THE YEAR IS NAMED ACTFL NATIONAL TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Christine Lanphere, Natomas (CA) High School French teacher, was named the recipient of the 2007 ACTFL National Language Teacher of the Year Award. The presentation was made at the 40th Annual Conference and Exposition of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages in Nashville, TN on November 17, 2006. Lanphere, who resides in Elk Grove, CA, has 13 years of experience as a language educator and serves as World Languages Department Chair at Natomas. The award, which is sponsored by publisher McDougal Littell, was created to recognize a foreign language teacher at the K-12 level who exhibits excellence in classroom language teaching. The selection process includes the submission of a portfolio and a teaching video. as well as an interview with the selection committee. California, as well as Hawai'i, is a state member of the Southwest Conference on Language Teaching (SWCOLT), so this is a big win for our region.

A total of six scholarships will be awarded by the Embassy of France, the Embassy of Spain, the Goethe-Institut, the Interamerican University Studies Institute, the Universidad Internacional-Center for Linguistic Multicultural Studies, and the Cemanahuac Educational Community.

TASK-BASED LANGUAGE TEACHING CONFERENCE IN SEPTEMBER



NFLRC PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN 2007



2007 NFLRC Summer Institute University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa, Honolulu, HI May 28 - June 6, 2007

This NFLRC Summer Institute is designed to help college foreign language administrators and teachers engage in useful, practical, and effective program evaluations to meet a variety of purposes. It takes seriously the values, goals, and constraints that characterize college language programs and will provide language educators with a user-oriented approach to developing evaluations that maximize benefits for language learners and teachers, while minimizing potential negative consequences. It will also provide participants with tools and strategies for making program evaluation a systematic and consistently useful component of their FL departments.

The Institute will be run by Dr. John M. Norris (UH Dept. of Second Language Studies), an expert in language program evaluation and assessment. Activities over the 9-day institute will include lectures and demonstrations, in-depth analyses of practical evaluation examples, invited guest speakers (language evaluation experts), social events, and extensive hands-on development and discussion of evaluation plans, procedures, and instruments for immediate use in the participants specific program settings.

This workshop is intended for foreign language administrators and teachers who are directly responsible for program evaluations in their foreign language departments. It assumes no prior grounding in program evaluation theory or practice, but it requires a willingness to help increase evaluation capacity in college FL education. In order to maximize the impact of this event across U.S. colleges, participants will be purposefully

selected to represent diverse FL program types, based on size, languages taught, geography, and institutional status. Some financial support is available to all participants in the NFLRC Summer Institute, on a competitive and space-limited basis. Summer Institute participants will be expected to participate in the 2007 ADFL Summer Seminar West, which will directly follow the workshop on the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa campus.

NNELL AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING SUPPORT OF EARLY SECOND LANGUAGE LEARNING

The NNELL Award for Outstanding Support of Early Second Language Learning will be given to an individual or individuals who have demonstrated *outstanding support of early second language learning of languages other than English*. Nominees may be actively involved in their efforts in a variety of ways including, but not limited to, the following: principal or other school administrator, district or state school superintendent, classroom teacher, parent, school board member, businessperson, civic leader, politician/elected representative. *Nominees should be individuals whose primary job responsibilities are not related to the field of second language education.*

The nomination for this award will be in the form of two letters of recommendation (a letter of recommendation and a letter of support) from individuals who can attest to the nominee's work in the field of early language learning. The letter of nomination *must come from a current NNELL member*, and the letter of support should be written by another individual who is very familiar with the nominee's work for early language learning. The letters should include documentation that clearly demonstrates evidence of the ways in which the nominee supports early language learning and that is clearly separate and distinct from the individual's primary job responsibilities.

The nomination may also include up to five photocopied pages of supporting evidence such as copies of newspaper articles that recognize the nominee's work for early language learning (brochures, pamphlets, etc. will not be accepted). The following are examples of criteria that can be considered in writing the letters of nomination as they apply to the nominee's work on behalf of early language learning:

- Demonstrates commitment to early second language learning in the school and the community, e.g., seeks ways to inform the community of the need for beginning language study early as an integral part of the school curriculum and in an uninterrupted sequence
- Provides visibility to the second language program, e.g., seeks media and/or newspaper publicity of school foreign language events, sends newsletter with second language program updates to parents
- Provides leadership in establishing and maintaining early second language programs at the local or state level
- Supports and provides professional development opportunities for early second language specialists
- Advocates for early second language programs at the local or state level, e.g., represents his or her foreign language program at local or state school board meetings
- Serves on local or state committees for early second language learning, e.g., advocacy projects, state world/foreign language association committee or board, PTA
- Supports exemplary ongoing second language instruction in his/her classroom, e.g., collaborates with the world language specialist on interdisciplinary projects

MENSA EDUCATION AND RESEARCH FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

ELIGIBILITY for MENSA scholarships:

The <u>only eligibility requirements</u> are that the applicant be enrolled, for the academic year following the award, in a degree program in an accredited American institute of post-secondary education and be a resident of the area of a participating local group of American Mensa. For the general awards, the applicant need <u>not</u> be a member of Mensa nor qualified for Mensa, and the general awards are unrestricted as to age, race, gender, level of post-secondary education and financial need.

CONDITIONS of awards:

Awards will be made on the basis of an essay of fewer than 550 words, which describes the applicant's career, vocational, or academic goal toward which the scholarship is to provide aid.

Entries will be judged and awarded at three levels: local, regional, and national. Awards are made in amounts ranging from \$300 to \$1000.
