# **Edith Kuttner Essay Contest**

The Hawai'i Association of Language Teachers invites all Hawai'i high schools to join the first annual Edith Kuttner Language Learning Essay Contest. The theme of this year's contest is "The importance of language learning." High school language programs statewide are encouraged to locally administer this contest to select an entry for submission to HALT by March 8, 2006 (one entry per school). The winning student essay will be announced during the HALT Annual Conference luncheon at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Spalding Hall Auditorium on March 18, 2006, 12:45-2:00 pm. The winner will be awarded a cash prize of \$100.00, educational materials, and a Certificate of Recognition.

The essay contest is being held in honor of Edith Kuttner, past HALT president and tireless advocate for language teaching, particularly the teaching of less commonly taught languages. After her retirement from a public school in New York as a Spanish teacher, Edith got involved with the Hawai'i Association of Language Teachers and worked with local teachers on various projects. At the time of her death in 2003, she was the president of Teleclass International, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving heritage (community) languages in Hawai'i.

The Edith Kuttner Memorial Fund, established by colleagues in her honor, will be used to fund the essay contest and build awareness among youths on the importance of world languages in their lives.

## Joan Rubin's Keynote Talk

The Hawai'i Association of Language Teachers is honored to have Joan Rubin as our keynote speaker for this, our 20<sup>th</sup> Annual HALT Conference, March 18<sup>th</sup> at UH Mānoa. Dr. Rubin is author of numerous books and articles and is widely known for work in sociolinguistics, especially issues in bilingualism and language planning. Her work in language learning strategies and learner management is equally well known.

In her extensive career she has been to Hawai'i several times for language and linguistic projects with the University of Hawai'i and the East-West Center. And we are very happy to have her with us once again!

Dr. Rubin's keynote talk will be on *Promoting listening comprehension--the neglected skill*:

"Listening in a foreign language presents a serious challenge for students. Helping language learners learn 'how to listen' is a critical skill because most people spend at least 50% of their time listening, much of language learning begins with listening, and focusing on listening can enhance other skills. This presentation will provide some new ways to help your students become better listeners and better learners." Please join us at HALT this year!

# MEDIEVAL WELSH AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAI'I



To date, more than 100 students have studied medieval Welsh at the Univ. of Hawai'i Mānoa, successfully learning to read about King Arthur and other Welsh heroes in a wholly-unknown language in a single semester. Medieval Welsh has been taught regularly at UHM since 1992, most recently in Fall 2005. First offered as a directed reading, Masterpieces of Medieval Welsh Literature (LLEA 682) became a regularly scheduled course in the 1995-1996 academic year. Seven students have chosen to go on for a second semester; three of those have done a third semester, and one student even did a fourth semester. Another graduate student designed an introductory workbook in 1995, which has been revised and is still in use.

The course draws students from Univ. of Hawai'i doctoral programs in English, History, and Linguistics, as well as those in a wide variety of Master's programs (particularly French, Spanish, German), and students who are genuinely curious to try something new and different. Undergraduates are welcome and have been markedly successful in the course. Each semester two full texts are read. plus sections of two others. Texts read include: Pwyll, Lludd a Llefelys, Owein (The Lady of the Fountain), sections of Culhwch ac Olwen and other stories, and most recently, Cân Rolant (The Song of Roland). Student evaluations have been very positive: "challenging and beneficial"; "I would recommend this course [Welsh] to anyone"; "a great learning experience than can be carried on into other classes"; "magic!".

LLEA 682 was recently written up in the newsletter of the Welsh-American Society of Northern California; when Dr. Gareth Williams of the editorial staff visited Oʻahu in December 2005, he participated in the final session of the course, to the delight of professor and students alike. LLEA 682 at the University of Hawaiʻi is taught by Prof. Kathryn Klingebiel (Languages and Literatures of Europe and the Americas).


### ABOUT HALT (WWW.HALTHOME.ORG)
